Spirituality for the Long Haul - Monica Hilbert



Ordinary Time - Part II begins on the Eve of Pentecost and ends the first Sunday of Advent.

The two seasons of the Liturgical Year that are marked as Ordinary Time are made up of no great earthshaking mysteries of the faith. These periods call for no rigorous fasts, nor develop around any overwhelmingly impressive feasts. It is simply the continuous, faithful, weekly attention to what it means to live out daily what we say we believe when we're at those mountaintop moments of the spiritual life. Ordinary Time II now moves us into a restful time of the Church year.

As we continue our journey in Ordinary Time, we may discover it may not be so ordinary at all. In fact, it may prove to be quite extraordinary. Ordinary Time is much like Winter for the early Native Americans. Survival was dependent on all the preparations completed throughout the other three seasons. Looking back, how have we prepared ourselves throughout the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter? Are we now ready to journey into this next Liturgical Season and quietly rest and reflect on the mysteries we celebrated throughout the other seasons? What work was accomplished in us as we journeyed through them? Each of those Liturgical Seasons brought their own special meaning while preparing us for this Ordinary Time to which we must be diligent, patient and focus on the spiritual work that needs to be accomplished in our lives. It is a time of deep reflection. Don't be fooled by the lack of activity during Ordinary Time, for there is much to be accomplished in us throughout these days. This is a time to thank God for His gifts given to us in the other Liturgical Seasons. It is also a hibernating time; a time to pull back into ourselves to accomplish our spiritual work. And now, more than ever, it is a time of learning to pull back into our families, the beauty of the environment, the value of close friends and who we are as Christians and as one human race. It is a time to be still and "Know That I Am God – and you are with me." It is a time to remember who we are, who made us, and that we are part of all that is.

Cherish Ordinary Time. Live it. Notice what you have and what is really important in your life. Then quietly, but deeply, celebrate that. Give thanks and praise and know that Ordinary Time is really an extraordinary time. This, then, will become a hallmark moment and turning point in your spiritual life. Rest in the knowledge that God will carry you through. God is here for all of us. All we need to do is ask. God is in us and we in Him.

What makes Ordinary Time extraordinary? It may be just noting that nothing is really different in the Church this year than it was last year. But begin to notice that the Liturgical Year becomes a spiraling adventure of the spiritual life. This time is a gift given to reflect, to grow, to learn and to keep our faith alive by practicing it. Use the wisdom you have been given – especially in our world today. Humans need to slow down, give thanks, be still, be grateful. We are extraordinary beings - in an ordinary place - in extraordinary times.
